#### **Foreword**

As I leave the Board of The New World Foundation after serving eight years, four of them as President, I take pride in reporting personal pleasure and satisfaction, as well as institutional health and productivity.

Through a strong board and staff, the continuity of the vision and purpose of the founders has been firmly established. In addition, new areas of activity have been developed that reflect the Board's new sense of purpose as initiator of policy as well as grant decision maker. While holding fast to the central concern for those Americans who have been most flagrantly and persistently denied full participation in the opportunities of the society, the Board has reactivated one of the areas of emphasis outlined in Anita McCormick Blaine's original bequest: "relationships between peoples and nations and the avoidance of war."

The Board's concern about issues of peace, the rapid increase in military spending and in particular the prevention of nuclear war led to an examination of a possible role for the Foundation in this area. Following a process of exploration and discussion involving staff, several consultors, and individual board members, the Foundation held regional consultations in areas around the country with diverse economic, ethnic and social groups.

Out of these lengthy discussions and consultations came a statement prepared by the Board that marked New World Foundation's approach to grantmaking to further the avoidance of war. Most especially, the Board has stressed the significance of the relationship between peace and social justice and sought to advance understanding of the choices currently being made between escalating military spending and the dislocation of resources for human needs. Thus the resulting statement put the Foundation on the line against "immoderate escalation in military spending," but also conveyed a historical commitment to justice in our society, remarking that "we will remain committed to the struggle to make the issues of justice and equity inseparable from the pursuit of peace.

#### THE NEW WORLD FOUNDATION

During this period the Foundation has also reviewed its traditional commitment in the field of education. Staff and Board have strengthened the connection between the Foundation's Equal Rights and Opportunities and Education program areas. This reassessment, which is planned to continue, recognizes public education as a central element in the expansion of equal rights and opportunities. In this perspective, public education is viewed as key in the futherance of effective political and economic participation of hitherto and dispossessed citizens. In the course of this work, the Board has taken pride in and recommitted itself to rejecting the prevailing sense of discouragement with the public education system and providing support to people, plans and programs mobilized to educating all of our children in effective schools.

#### Introduction

Once again, I use the opportunity of preparing a brief introduction to a New World Foundation report to speak of the people who make the whole thing work; those who give the endeavor its meaning and those who contribute to its purposes and tasks. The people involved in a foundation fall into four broad categories. There are those who have given it its history; those who give it direction by serving on its board; those who manage its affairs and relate to those with whom it works by serving as staff or consultants; and there are those who determine whether the Foundation ultimately makes any contribution of significance or not—namely, those who receive its grants and engage in the activities to which it is devoted.

The listing of grantees which follows reminds us that it is indeed these organizations and institutions that make a difference with regard to the ideals hoped for in our society. But a list such as this assumes but does not single out for acclaim the many persons with their skills, drive, imagination and personal commitment, who as staff and volunteers, work in the offices, the classrooms, the meetings, the training sessions, the blocks being organized, the strategy sessions and the research libraries. Yet these are the people to whom the Foundation owes its greatest appreciation and who we wish to honor as we report grants made and programs carried out.

Each such report as this, has acknowledged the special role that the Board of Directors of The New World Foundation plays. That special contribution remains vital. The Board is active in governance, with imagination and enthusiasm. But while the tradition of a strong New World Foundation Board continues, individuals complete their service to the Board and leave it. Gilbert Harrison, who decided to leave the Board, has left a legacy of understanding and urgency about international concerns. Karl Mathiasen continues as friend and counselor to staff while retiring from the Board after having served the Foundation as Board member, Treasurer and President (now to be called Board Chair) wisely and well. Beatrix Hamburg will be missed as she retires

having served the Board with competence and sensitivity. Adrian W. DeWind has served the Foundation as Board member and General Counsel. His retirement from the Board has been softened by his continued participation in the

affairs of the Foundation as legal counsel.

We are pleased that Hillary Rodham Clinton of Little Rock, Arkansas, and David Blaine Harrison of San Francisco, California, have joined the Board, bringing to it fresh experience and keen insight. David succeeds his father, Gilbert Harrison, thereby continuing the presence on the Board of a member of the family of Anita McCormick Blaine. It was her wisdom and foresight which established both a portion of her resources as the basis for the grantmaking of the Foundation and the purposes it serves as well. Indeed, we remain committed to the purposes for which we were endowed by Mrs. Blaine with her extraordinary insight, conviction and courage.

A foundation's staff changes too, as individuals move to other opportunities. Ghebre Selassie Mehreteab, Catherine R. Chieco, Wendy Tachikawa and Kay Nishiyama have left the staff of the Foundation and we are pleased to express appreciation for their individual contributions to the work and purposes of the Foundation. We are pleased, also, to welcome Colin Greer and Susan Moyes to the staff and we are grateful to have had the consultant services of Charlie Biggs, David Cohen and Annette Hutchins during these months.

The Foundation has operated in recent years with increasing inability to respond to the needs of communities as public resources have been withdrawn. Our attempt to help to limit the decline of opportunity and rights for all Americans has been advanced not only by our grant-making but by our joining with our colleagues in the foundation community to call attention to the critical need for the protection of voting rights, legal services, services for children and community services. We have been enthusiastic in our support for those citizen initiatives that give continuing evidence that this is still a society that cares about its members.

The New World Foundation's modest program for the "avoidance of war" has been part of a rising awareness amongst growing numbers of our fellow citizens that security ultimately derives from the desire for quality and continuity in our lives and in our communities; economic stability, public health and social justice for all in our society; and open and collaborative relations with neighbors, domestically and internationally. We continue to support programs which believe in the possibility of a world in which neither race

nor gender limit possibility for fulfillment; in which the structures of commerce, health, education and government are just and serve the aspirations and enhance the security of all; and in a world which is free of the debilitating effects and the horrible threat of the weapons that could destroy us all.

I, therefore, introduce this report to celebrate all of those persons who have worked hard to keep alive the hope that a better, if not a new world, is possible.

Southern Regional Office

This office of the ACLU was opened in the early sixties, and its efforts are mainly directed toward attacking invidious local voting schemes, discrimination in jury selection and bar admissions, the effect of which is to decimate Black political participation and influence. Other techniques of disenfranchisement which the Southern Office is combating include gerrymandered reapportionment, discriminatory registration purges, re-registration requirements and discriminatory action by political parties.

Southern Regional Office's Voter Law Project

The grant for the Southern Office's Voter Law Project supported continuation of the Project's litigation program and for research and public education programs aimed to support a strong role in a broadly based coalition of national civil rights and public interest groups.

Through its communications programs, Western Network works in an eleven-state area. The Network aims to achieve a more equitable distribution of such basic resources as water through improved decision-making processes in which all regional constituencies are participants. By providing a balanced and objective presentation of points of view with business and agricultural associations, Indian governments, state and federal agencies, and environmentalists, the Network facilitates the formation of cooperative distributional agreements.

## - General Information

The Directors of The New World Foundation are responsible for giving practical expression and for emphasizing and interpreting one or more of the testamentary objectives of Anita McCormick Blaine.

In fulfilling this responsibility, the Foundation has attempted to be particularly responsive to the needs and aspirations of neglected segments of our society and to support programs which have creative and innovative individuals working with them.

Currently the Directors have determined that the following shall be the principal areas of interest for the Foundation's consideration of grant applications:

#### A. Equal Rights and Opportunities

The goal of the Foundation has consistently been to create an atmosphere in which all groups share in the social, civil and economic benefits of a democratic society. It seeks to respond to efforts by and on behalf of minorities which are attempting to break down barriers and to establish means of access to full and equal rights and opportunities.

#### B. Public Education

The Foundation is concerned that each child receive that schooling, from pre-school through high school, which provides the knowledge, skills and taste for excellence that will expand the child's opportunities for an economically secure, personally satisfying, and socially useful life. The Foundation is concerned with how subjects may better be presented to and mastered by young people of varied capacities and backgrounds, and how systems can be made to work better and for the benefit of all. The Foundation is especially concerned with the roles which parents and communities play in achieving these goals.

#### C. Public Health

The Foundation seeks to raise standards for public and personal health and advance community's and people's capacity to achieve them. The Foundation is particularly concerned with the health needs of the disadvantaged, and to encourage the development of community interest in and

#### LIMITATIONS

The Foundation ordinarily makes grants only to tax-exempt organizations or to projects administered by a tax-exempt organization.

The Foundation does not make contributions for general charitable purposes such as community fund drives, schools and hospitals, building and endowment funds, or other capital funding. It does not make grants to individuals, nor does it support scholarships, academic research, films, publications, media and arts projects, or direct social service delivery programs. It does not make general support grants to organizations which enjoy broad popular support nor does it provide support for programs operating outside the United States.

#### PROCEDURE AND DEADLINES

All requests to the New World Foundation should be addressed to the Executive Director at 100 East 85 Street, New York, New York 10028.

The Foundation has no standard application form or deadlines. A concise proposal, addressed to the Executive Director should contain the following information as applicable:

- a cover letter which briefly summarizes the proposal and states the amount requested from the New World Foundation;
- a description of the specific project;
- objectives, a timetable for their achievement, and the strategies and methods by which they will be attained;
- a brief description of the sponsoring organization;
- the organization's budget for the fiscal year during which funds are being sought and a budget for the specific project being proposed;
- if possible an audited report for the previous Fiscal year or if an audit is not available then a financial statement for the prior period;
- the current sources of support and amount of income, and a list of sources from which additional funds are being solicited;
- a copy of the ruling granting federal tax exemption.

The Foundation acknowledges receipt of proposals by postcard or letter. Projects to be considered for a grant by the Board of Directors will generally be so notified six weeks after the proposal's acknowledgment. If the project is to receive Board review, an interview or field visit will be arranged. Staff are generally unable to arrange appointments with prospective grantees prior to receipt and review of a written proposal.

responsibility for health protection. The Foundation is especially committed to raising occupational health and safety standards and protections and reducing environmental hazards to health.

D. Community Initiatives

The Foundation is interested in supporting community initiatives in which citizens develop and direct efforts to make equal justice, equal opportunity and improved quality of community life a reality; to create more responsive and effective service delivery systems; and to meet community needs in ways that enhance the lives of residents in rural and urban communities throughout the country.

E. Avoidance of War

The Foundation seeks to endorse and support strategies to reduce the threat of war and particularly nuclear war. In its attempt to encourage broad-based efforts in this arena, the Foundation particularly aims to explore the linkage between domestic issues and traditional reliance on military strength to ensure national security. It also seeks to expand public understanding of how genuine world security will be accomplished through cooperation and equitable and just relationships. The Foundation seeks to join others in the struggle for social justice and peace. In our work at the Foundation, we remain committed to making the issues of justice and equality inseparable from the pursuit of peace.

## Guidelines for Grant Applications

The Foundation will provide start-up money to initiate programs as well as funds for new projects created by established organizations. It seeks to provide a bridge between the initial needs of innovative programs and their achievement of greater support from the public, other foundations or government agencies.

Each proposal will be assessed by its ability to fulfill the following criteria:

- talented personnel, including innovative, creative, and sound managerial and personal skills among the program's leadership;
- clearly articulated objectives and goals;
- active, ongoing equal-opportunity leadership development;
- substantial plan to acquire adequate support to complete the proposed project or to achieve self sufficiency

cluded in the program related investments is a \$400,000 investment in Cooperative Assistance Fund approved under prior Board resolution.

Based on the Foundation management's evaluation of the Cooperative Assistance Fund investment, an \$87,500 allowance for possible losses was provided in a prior year. Foundation management's valuation of all current program related loans and investments indicate no need to increase this allowance.

#### 4. Tax Status and Federal Excise Taxes:

The Foundation is considered a private foundation and is subject to federal excise taxes and other restrictions under the applicable provisions of the Internal Revenue Code. The excise tax is imposed at the rate of 2% on realized investment income net of related expenses. The Foundation's federal returns have been examined by the Internal Revenue Service through the year ended September 30, 1980. Allocation formulas used to compute net investment income for all years were accepted as filed and these formulas have been applied to in the succeeding year.

#### 5. Payable on Security Transactions:

As of September 30, 1982 there was an unsettled security transaction in the amount of \$229,700. As of September 30, 1981 there were no unsettled security transactions.

#### 6. Bequest Received:

During the fiscal year ended September 30, 1981, the Foundation received \$6,667 as its share of the proceeds from the sale of a small parcel of land owned by the Estate of Anita McCormick Blaine. No further funds are expected from this Estate.

#### 7. Commitments and Contingencies:

#### Litigation

The Foundation's management knows of no current or pending litigation.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

September 30, 1982 and 1981

#### 1. Significant Accounting Policies:

- (a) Security transactions are recorded on a trade date basis. Investments are stated at cost including unamortized portion of premiums paid on bonds. Bond premiums are amortized ratably from date of acquisition to maturity date and the result charged to income. Options sold are recognized as income upon expiration or as part of proceeds of sale if exercised.
- (b) Generally accepted accounting principles require capitalization of major purchases of furniture, fixtures and equipment. Since 1977, all acquisitions were capitalized and are being depreciated on a straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of 5 to 10 years.
- (c) Land, building and building improvements are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation on a straight-line method as follows:

Building . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . . 40 years
Building improvements . . . . . . . . . . . . . 10-15 years

The property has been classified by the City of New York as a "landmark" which may adversely affect its potential marketability.

- (d) Grants authorized by the Board of Directors are recorded as liabilities as to the portion due within one year. For the portion approved by the Board beyond one year, no liability exists until re-approval in the applicable fiscal year by the Executive Director.
- (e) Unrestricted grant income is recognized when received. Restricted grants are recognized as income to the extent that the restrictions have been fulfilled.

#### 2. Investments:

The approximate market value of investments \$16,853,119 and \$16,851,014 at September 30, 1982 and 1981 include \$192,659 and \$192,120 with respect to securities acquired by private placement at cost of \$206,728 and \$235,954 respectively.

Estimated market values were obtained by using the price as of the close of business on September 30, 1982 and 1981 for listed securities, the average of bid or asked price for over-the-counter securities and from values determined by the Foundation's investment advisors for all non-marketable securities.

#### 3. Program related investments:

On December 11, 1980, the Foundation's Board of Directors approved a resolution allowing the Foundation to make program related investments and loans that do not meet normal investment criteria up to a maximum of 5% of the total market value of the Foundation's investments as of the close of each fiscal year. These investments are to provide for a minimum of 5% per annum return, or in the case of loans, as close to the current rates of interest as seems feasible. Further, such program related investments or loans must meet the requirements under the law to qualify as distributions in the event of loss. As of September 30, 1982, and 1981 the Foundation has open program related loans of \$65,000 and \$26,000 and program related investments, at cost of \$499,000. In-

# THE SHALAN FOUNDATION

1983 has seen a great increase in the number of requests we receive, as established and newly formed organizations seek to develop solutions to deeply rooted social, environmental and economic dislocations.

Shalan concentrates its funding on organizations working within the United States which explore the development of economic policy and program to increase social justice and environmental balance. We primarily fund groups in the Western States which seek to affect state, regional and national public policy on important economic issues.

Currently, we are funding several coalition organizations in key areas of the economy and we feel encouraged by groups which reach out beyond their individual issues and constituencies to build consensus programs around shared values and broader social goals.

We believe that successful policy development must include the following steps:

- Increased recognition of problem areas: to be achieved through research and public education so that widespread awareness of social and economic problems will lead to a consensus that policy alternatives must be developed;
- development of recommended solutions: through action-oriented research and examination of new ideas;
- widespread public debate on policy alternatives: through multi-faceted programs of public education with major constituencies;
- solutions implemented: through action by a legislative or executive arm of the government; litigation; or long-term changes in personal values and actions.

Our major new direction this year has been to begin a grant program to address the *implementa-tion portion* of the spectrum of strategies. We feel that it is essential for a vigorous working democracy that new ideas and organizations have a fair opportunity to have their policy options seriously considered by the larger society. Many of Shalan's grantees, representing low and moderate income persons and/or addressing issues in which major entrenched economic interests may be challenged, have had difficulty in presenting their solutions for public consideration.

For this reason, our grant program aims to encourage greater citizen participation in the process of policy consideration and implementation. Activities funded include registering voters, educating individuals and organizations regarding effective participation in the system of public policy formulation, and examining the rules and regulations within the electoral process which define the opportunities for presentation and examination of a variety of ideas.

In our major effort in this arena, Shalan provided seed money for *Initiatives for Campaign Reform* (an activity of the Youth Project), a program of research and policy development which is focused on the State of California. We are very proud of the quality of ICR's work and its contribution to serious consideration of ways to open policy debate and ensure the broadest participation in the electoral process in California.

We look forward to continuing work with public interest groups and foundations in this vital area of access to the democratic decision-making system.

We recognize the immense challenges faced by a large, heterogeneous democracy, in a complex world, seeking to find creative ways to ensure that basic human needs are met and that the opportunity for a fully realized life is available to all people regardless of their economic status. We are convinced that failure to find ways to meet these goals will result in increasing individual human misery and massive social dislocation — with grave dangers to even the continuation of human life on this planet. Success can open a new era of human growth and sense of hope and possibility.

We are proud to be working with so many organizations and individuals who share our commitment, and we welcome your thoughts and comments on our efforts.



### In Memory of the "Tweed Hornet".

"She told it the way it was, no matter what." In the fall of '87, Maxine Cushing Gray died after a long illness and with that passing, our region lost one of the strongest advocates for adequate arts funding, assuring quality of life for individual artists and achieving particular recognition for Native Americans. She was known as the "tweed hornet" for her tenacity, her non-negotiable insistence on excellence and quality "in all things."

Fortunately the spirit of this remarkable woman lives on. In 1985 a group of her friends established, at *The Seattle Foundation*, THE MAXINE CUSHING GRAY FELLOWSHIP FOR WRITERS FUND. Its intent is to annually honor a Northwest writer of poetry or prose, a playwright, a journalist or a critic. This was done "in celebration of the 10th anniversary of Northwest Arts and her contribution to the arts community in the Northwest over the past 40 years." The principal of the donated funds remains intact, allowing the use of the income only for the yearly prize. Since one of Maxine's strongest wishes was "all artists and writers be given just recognition and financial reward", the growth of this fund will perpetuate her convictions in its ability to grant larger annual prizes to deserving Northwest writers. The first two awards were made to historian and critic Murray Morgan and to poet David Wagoner.

To her many friends, we thank you for your recent contributions. And we invite others to continue to remember the "tweed hornet". Her presence was profound in this city. Her MAXINE CUSHING GRAY FELLOWHIP FOR WRITERS FUND at *The Seattle Foundation* perpetuates her indomitable spirit.

I called you on March 18, 1988 requesting information about the status of the Church World Service consideration of our September proposal for funding of the CWIS Fourth World Mitigation Project. You advised that a response would be forthcoming in one to two weeks. We are, quite naturally, eager to hear if we will have support for this important project. As of this date, we have not received a response to our inquiries.

We have worked to gain funding support from a good many sources, but we have not received positive consideration except by the National Council of Churches. Since the National Council of Churches was good enough to support our efforts to promote peace negotiations between the Miskito, Sumo and Rama Indian Nations and the Republic of Nicaragua in the past, we are particularly hopeful that your support for our similar efforts involving the West Papuans, South Moluccans, Chakma and others will also be forthcoming.

I have enclosed copies of two letters of support from the Homeland Mission of the Republic of South Moluccas and the International Spokesman for the Jana Samhati Samiti which represents the peoples of the Chittagong Hill Tracts Region of Bangladesh.

We await your response.

### BACKGROUND

The Center for World Indigenous Studies (CWIS) is an Indian controlled, non-profit research and education corporation chartered under the laws of the State of Washington in March 1984. The U.S. Internal Revenue Service recognizes CWIS as a non-profit organization under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Service Code.

CWIS was founded as a direct result of a joint proposal by Tribal leaders at the Conference of Tribal Governments in Tukwila, Washington in 1978, and a similar call by the World Council of Indigenous Peoples in Regina, Saskatchewan in 1981. Indian leaders expressed the need for a research and documentation center which would emphasize studies which strengthen tribal governments and communities. Leaders, furthermore, sought to establish an organization which would pool and focus the intellectual energies of talented indigenous people on the resolution of pressing social, economic and political problems faced by Indigenous peoples in the United States and the Western Hemisphere, and by other indigenous peoples throughout the world.

The purpose of the Center for World Indigenous Studies is accordingly formalized as follows:

To promote, through research, study, people exchanges, education and communications:

the preservation of indigenous peoples' national territorial rights;

the advancement of knowledge from the perspective of indigenous peoples;

 the capacity of exceptional individuals within indigenous communities to contribute to a wider understanding of the situation of indigenous societies and nations;

• the ability of indigenous communities and nations to make informed decisions about the defense of their homelands:

 the contribution of knowledgeable indigenous views and ideas to the global dialogue for peaceful relations between peoples.

### CWIS POLICY DIRECTION

The Center for World Indigenous Studies is governed by a five member Board of Directors, three of whom must be members of indigenous nations or tribes. The Board of Directors meets once each year in January to conduct an annual meeting to review the previous year's accomplishments and approve an annual report. The Board of Directors is chaired by Rudolph C. Ryser, a member of the Cowlitz Indian Tribe with eighteen years professional experience. He was a former staff person on the American Indian Policy Review Commission, Executive Director of the Small Tribes Organization of Western Washington, Acting Executive Director of the National Congress of American Indians, Advisor to the President of the Quinault Indian Nation and Special Assistant to the President of the World Council of Indigenous Peoples. Dr. Kenneth Benshoof, a Professor of Music at the University of Washington serves as Secretary. Mr. Joseph W. Ryan, an attorney and former Director of the American Friends Service Committee Indian Program, serves as Treasurer. Mr. Russell Jim, a member of the Yakima Indian Nation and former member of the Yakima Tribal Council, and currently the Director of the Yakima Nation Nuclear Waste Program sits as a member of the Board. Mr. Eluska is the President of the Koniag Native Corporation and the Director of Rural Education at the University of Alaska.

The Board of Directors depends in part upon the views and opinions of a Founding Advisory Board which includes nine members. Founding Advisory Board members include individuals actively involved in the promotion of Indian Rights or the rights of indigenous peoples generally. Advisory Board members include: Apesanakwat, a Chairman of the Menominee Tribe; Chief George Manuel of the Shuswap Nation, Dr. Bernard Q. Nietschmann, Professor of Geography at the University of California - Berkeley; Ms. Sharon Eluska, a member of the Navajo Nation; Mr. Lars Anders-Baer, Nordic Sami Council; Mr. Jacob Marule, a member of the Shoa Tribe; Mr. Yann Celene Uregei, a member of the Kanak Nation; Mr. Joseph Tallakson, Sense, Inc.; and Dr. John H. Bodley, Professor of Anthropology

at Washington State University.

### **CWIS ACTIVITIES**

### FOURTH WORLD PAPERS PROGRAM

CWIS produces six publications through its Fourth World Papers Program. Publications range from periodic newsletters like the Northwest Monitor which reports on human rights issues in the Northwest part of the United States and Southwest part of Canada, and CWIS Notes which reports CWIS program activities to booklets, the bi-monthly Fourth World Journal and Ocassional Papers. Issues of interest among Indian and other indigenous peoples, and the general public are covered in articles written by indigenous men and women from throughout the world. Solicited articles are received from a network of contributors (writers, educators, indigenous leaders and activists) who sit on CWIS Working Groups and members of the CWIS Founding Advisory Board as well as members of the CWIS Staff. Unsolicited articles are also received from independent contributors. Contributors live in fourteen countries including: The United States of America, Canada, Australia, New Caledonia, Federation of Micronesia, Mexico, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Peru, Sweden, England, Holland, the Philippines and Japan.

Writers are encouraged to examine topics by comparing situations of indigenous peoples in various parts of the world or indicating the wider implications of their analysis for indigenous peoples elsewhere in the world. Innovations

in thinking and analysis are frequently the product of contributors to CWIS publications.

### **CWIS** Notes

CWIS Notes is an internal organizational newsletter, periodically published for the benefit of CWIS Board Members, Founding Advisory Board members, personnel and network participants. It reports on the various activities of CWIS programs, centers and projects; and describes organizational policies, changes in policies and administrative activities. As an internal organ, CWIS Notes not only serves as a management and organizational aid, it provides people closely associated with CWIS with information about CWIS and the opportunity to contribute to improvements in the organization.

Edited by Richard Griggs, of Oakland, California, the Fourth World Journal is published six times each year and sent to subscribers living in twenty countries. When the subject matter warrants, complimentary copies of the Fourth World Journal are sent to non-subscribing political leaders or educators in Indian or other Indigenous Nations. The Fourth World Journal is also made available to libraries on request.

Because of the contemporaneous nature of Fourth World Journal articles, it is frequently used in Political Science, Anthropology, Education and Geography courses at Cornell University, University of Colorado at Boulder, University of California at Berkeley, Stanford University, Washington State University, University of Washington, University of Lethbridge in Canada and the University of Queensland in Australia. Cultural Survival Quarterly in Massachusetts, the International Working Group on Indigenous Affairs Newsletter in Copenhagen, Denmark, Minority Rights Group in England, human rights publications of the United States Department of State and the United Nations Commission on Human Rights have sited and sometimes republished articles appearing in the Fourth World Journal.

### Fourth World Papers Series

When subjects require more in-depth consideration, the CWIS Fourth World Papers Program publishes single topic booklets as a part of the Fourth World Papers Series. Several titles of booklets include: OUR PEOPLE, OUR HOMELAND, INDIAN WAR AND PEACE IN NICARAGUA, and FOURTH WORLD GOVERNANCE. Authors include the President of the Quinault Indian Nation, Joe DeLaCruz, a writer/researcher Wilson Manyfingers, General Coordinator of MISURASATA, Brooklyn Rivera and Rudolph C. Ryser. In the future, the Fourth World Papers Series will publish TRIBAL MANAGEMENT STYLES, by Dr. Carol J. Minugh; NATIONS AND STATES IN CONFLICT: Toward an Era of Coexistence, by Rudolph C. Ryser.

Published titles are sent to libraries and made available for purchase by individuals and programs.

### Northwest Monitor

The Northwest Monitor is a monthly newsletter reporting events concerning human rights in the Pacific Northwest of the United States of America and Southwest Canada. It is a publication connected with the work of the Puget Sound Task Force on Human Rights, a project under the CWIS Global Exchange and Conflict Management Program. It includes articles about human rights events, activities of the Puget Sound Task Force on Human Rights, and progress toward the reduction of institutional racism.

Northwest Monitor is distributed to persons interested in the work of the Puget Sound Task Force on Human Rights, officials of Indian Governments, State Government, agencies of the U.S. Government; and minority rights organizations representing the Black community, Asian community, Hispanic community, Indian Community and the Jewish Community. Members of the Puget Sound Task Force on Human Rights are the principal contributors to this publication.

### Occasional Papers

A wide range of topics are published as single articles. Occasional Papers are published when a manuscript is too long for immediate inclusion in the Fourth World Journal or too short for publication as a single topic booklet. Research papers, essays, analysis and commentaries are published as Occasional Papers on a periodic basis, and distributed for a small fee to interested individuals or organizations concerned with a similar topic. Usually, contributors treat a subject in an unusual way or discuss innovations in thinking that have to do with continuing debate or inquiry in the indigenous intellectual community. CWIS Working Group members, individuals working on projects in indigenous communities and other interested persons are the frequent recipients of Occasional Papers.

### Fourth World Papers Catalogue

CWIS has a large a growing library of documents, speeches, records, and articles produced by indigenous organizations, governments and individuals from around the world. Materials are catalogued by world region, Indigenous nation and subject. Prints and reprint copies of these materials are made available to interested individuals and organizations for a small handling cost. The Fourth World Papers Program publishes a Fourth World Papers Catalogue which lists and describes available materials. The catalogue is sent free of charge

### FOURTH WORLD DOCUMENTATION CENTER

The Fourth World Documentation Center was established under the Center for World Indigenous Studies in response to growing requests from Indian governments, organizations and individuals in the United States of America, Canada, South Pacific, Melanesia, Central America, Southern Asia, Eastern Europe and South America for current and reliable information about the situation of indigenous nations. Its goal is to establish a computerized library of reports, records, documents and specific information concerning the human rights violations against Indigenous nations world-wide. Such information is gathered by individuals and organizations linked through a network which generates paper documentations and reports which are interpreted into a computerized database. The database contains references by Indigenous nation, State, and region. It is cross-referenced by topical categories including: Strategic, Economic, Political, Social, Human Rights, Laws & Treaties, and Geography.

The Documentation Center sponsors specific research projects which augment information gathered through the documentation network. It is also responsible for providing documentation for an International Tribunal on Genocide in Mexico and Central America being developed under the CWIS Global Exchange and Conflict Management Program in cooperation with Indigenous Nations in Europe, North America and Central America, and the Institute for the Study of Genocide in New York.

### Fourth World Atlas Project

This is a six-year project designed to research and develop a global map of Indigenous Nations and a region-by-region atlas which depicts the social, economic, political, and strategic situation of Indigenous Nations. The project is being conducted under the direction of Dr. Bernard Q. Nietschmann at the University of California - Berkeley, Department of Geography, assisted by Professor David Hyndman at the University of Queensland (Australia), Department of Sociology and Anthropology, and with the aid and assistance of the specific Indigenous Nations being mapped.

Initial mapping documents augment the Fourth World Documentation Center's primary library. Individual site studies are published as initial findings by the CWIS Fourth World Papers Program. Regional mapping studies are currently being conducted in the South Pacific and Melanesia, the United States of America, and Central America. The project seeks to involve members of each Indigenous nation in the mapping research and the actual cartography. Several specialized maps generated by this project are currently being used by the Western Shoshone National Council; Miskito, Sumo, and Rama Nations; the Chakma Tribe in the Chittagong Hill Tracts Region of Bangladesh and the West Papuans of Indonesia.

### Right-Wing Extremism and Anti-Indian Network Study

This is a year-long study of the impact Right-Wing Extremist and Anti-Indian organizations have on Indian Nations in the United States and Canada. The study is being conducted in cooperation with twenty Indian Nations and

organizations in the United States and Canada, the Puget Sound Task Force on Human Rights and the Center for Democratic Renewal in Atlanta, Georgia.

### Fourth World Seminar Series

An instructional component of the Fourth World Documentation Center is the Fourth World Seminar Series. Offered to indigenous governments and community organizations as a specific educational and instructional medium, the Seminar Series presents public workshops and short-courses on a range of topics. Three Seminars have been developed and presented on Indigenous Resource Management, Fourth World Governance and Computer Technology in Indigenous Administration. Resource people with specialized experience and knowledge present seminars for periods ranging from three hours to three days. Materials produced by the CWIS Fourth World Papers Program and the CWIS Indian Book Center augment the seminars. Seminars have been presented to the Lummi Nation, Quinault Indian Nation, Shoshone National Council, the Haida, and the National Inter-Tribal Timber Council.

Seminars are specifically tailored to the local conditions and participants. Information transfer is achieved through direct and indirect methods. Direct methods include lectures and audio-visual techniques. Indirect methods include the use of situational simulations which require the use of information as participants "act out roles" in games. A key element of the Seminars is the transfer of information and knowledge which has an immediate application in real-life conditions. Another key to the Seminars is the introduction of participant decision-making reliant on interpretation and a synthesis of existing knowledge and new information.

Seminars are presented at the request of specific institutions or groups, and minimum costs for development and presentation are born by individual participants or institutions.

### INDIAN BOOK CENTER

An important function of the Center for World Indigenous Studies is to expand educational and informational options to Indian and other indigenous peoples to maximize informed decision-making and enhance their creative contribution to human knowledge. The CWIS operated Indian Book Center, located in South Seattle at the Seattle Indian Heritage High School, is an important instrument for achieving this objective in Seattle and the Metropolitan Area, and on Indian Reservations and in native communities in Alaska and the U.S. west coast.

The Indian Book Center was established in 1985 with the cooperation of mainline publishers in the United States and a publisher consultant who assisted in the selection of books. The Book Center distributes new fiction and non-fiction books, booklets, text books, work books and reference works to individual Indian families and Indian programs as well as other minorities, handicapped persons and the elderly through its 12,000 square foot facility donated by the Seattle Indian Heritage High School. Books are distributed at the small handling fee of fifteen cents per book. This fee, combined with small grants renders the CWIS Indian Book Center virtually self-sustaining. Indian students attending the Seattle Indian Heritage High School work with the Book Center's Manager, James Ennis, for small stipends and the opportunity to gain valuable work experience.

### GLOBAL EXCHANGE & CONFLICT RESOLUTION PROGRAM

CWIS strongly emphasizes self-help and mutual assistance in relations between Indigenous peoples. A key element of this strategy is promotion of direct contacts between Indigenous nations and the discovery of innovative approaches to the resolution of conflicts. The Global Exchange & Conflict Resolution Program is the rubric through which CWIS research and education assumes an active role. Through this program, CWIS promotes direct application of ideas advanced for the strengthening of indigenous communities and governments. Concepts for the resolution of conflicts involving indigenous peoples are also tested through projects of specific application. Projects concern or directly affect the situation of Indigenous peoples or nations in Canada, United States of America, Mexico, Guatemala, El Salvador, Honduras, Nicaragua, Indonesia, the Philippines, Bangladesh, Australia, Eastern Europe, Africa, Brazil, Peru and Chile. The Fourth World Mitigation Project, Puget Sound Task Force on Human Rights, two international Working Groups, the Pana Pana International Support Group and International Tribunal on Genocide in Central America are among projects which operate under this program.

### Fourth World Mitigation Project

This project is an outgrowth of CWIS research on the impact of Transmigration Programs on Indigenous nations in Indonesia and Bangladesh, and a study on the significance of the World Bank's Tribal Economic Development policy. The purpose of this project is to test the possibility of organizing World Bank cooperation to stimulate negotiations between states governments and specific Indigenous nations to reverse the negative impacts of Transmigration Programs and World Bank development projects. Specific emphasis is on Indonesia and its relations with West Papua, South Molucca, and East Timor; Bangladesh and its relations with the Chakma and other tribes in the Chittagong Hill

Tracts Region and the Philippines in relations with the Kalinga, Bontoc and Lumad.

### Puget Sound Task Force on Human Rights

Representatives from religious, labor, government and social organizations in the Puget Sound Region of the State of Washington in the United States participate as members of this Task Force which was established in 1986. Asian, Black, Hispanic, Indian and Native, Jewish and White citizens join together to promote public tolerance of social and cultural differences between different communities in a multi-racial society. The Task Force advocates community organization to oppose racially motivated intimidation, harassment and violence sponsored by extremist white supremacist groups. It provides public education, organizational assistance, victim assistance, promotion of positive public policy and research. It distributes the NORTHWEST MONITOR.

### Working Group on Land Rights and National Integrity

Individual intellectuals, activists and community leaders based in organizations, educational institutions and indigenous communities participate in an active inquiry and analysis of methods for resolving conflicts between Indigenous nations and states, and stabilizing Indigenous nations in their use and possession of aboriginal lands and natural resources. Participants are located in Europe, the Western Hemisphere, southern Asia and the Pacific. Materials describing a particular nation/state dispute are sent to individual Working Group members with a series of questions raised by the nation concerned. Working Group members are encouraged to consider the issues, undertake individual analyses, share their views with other members and offer suggestions. Individual analyses or joint papers are published through the Fourth World Papers Program and submitted to concerned national leaders.

### Working Group on Alternative Food and Economic Strategies

Individual intellectuals, activists and community leaders based in organizations, educational institutions and indigenous communities participate in an active inquiry and analysis of alternative strategies for ensuring an Indigenous nations' food and economic security. As a result of human created or natural disruptions to food and economic conditions long enjoyed by Indigenous nations, they may suffer from malnutrition, economic dislocation or both. The Working Group is charged with examining various alternatives which may allow an Indigenous nation to resume its normal patterns or define new options. Participants are located in Africa, Europe, the Western Hemisphere, southern Asia and the Pacific. Materials describing a particular dislocation are sent to individual Working Group members with a series of questions raised by the nation concerned. Working Group members are encouraged to consider the issues, undertake individual analyses, share their views with other members and offer suggestions. Individual analyses or joint papers are published through the Fourth World Papers Program and submitted to concerned national leaders.

### Pana Pana International Support Group

As a consequence of a war between the state of Nicaragua and the Miskito, Sumo and Rama nations, the Indian peoples of Nicaragua have suffered. In 1985, an international effort was launched to organize support for the Miskito, Sumo and Rama nations as they seek peaceful resolution of the conflict and restoration of the economic, social, political and cultural life of their peoples. With more than one thousand individuals and a dozen organizations located in Europe and the Western Hemisphere, PANA PANA distributes information about the positions and views of the Miskito, Sumo and Rama nations, organizes material and popular support for community reconstruction and peace negotiations.

### International Tribunal on Genocide in Central America

In response to a 1984 decision by the World Council of Indigenous Peoples (in Panama City, Panama) calling for the establishment of an international tribunal on genocide, and persistent allegations of acts of genocide in southern Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, El Salvador and Nicaragua, this project was initiated. The project seeks to organize the Tribunal at a proposed site in Norway with the cooperation of the Nordic Sami Council and the Norwegian Parliament. Furthermore, an effort to organize international negotiations of a new Genocide Convention was begun.

### CWIS BUDGET SUMMARY

Virtually all CWIS administration and program implementation is supplied by volunteers; and facilities and many expenses are provided as in-kind contributions. The 1988 CWIS Budget is projected at \$288,392 with \$103,568 anticipated for administration and general fund, and \$184.824 projected for program and project costs. An estimated \$139,000 of this budget is expected to be provided through in-kind contributions. Major in-kind contributors include


Because of the existing situation we will keep your request on hold at this time waiting for new developments. Please, keep us informed of new developments.

Since 1984, the Center for World Indigenous Studies has conducted a number of projects under the Global Exchange & Conflict Resolution Program in Central America, North America and South East Asia. These projects have involved efforts aimed at resolving conflicts between Indigenous Nations and between Indigenous Nations and States. Our most recent effort involves the nations of West Papua, South Molucca and East Timor; the Chakma and the nations of Kalinga, Bontoc and Lumad. Each of these nations is in a conflict with a State (Indonesia, Bangladesh and the Philippines respectively). With the endorsement and agreement of each of the specified nations, the Center for World Indigenous Studies proposes to undertake an 18 month project aimed at establishing conditions for mutually cooperative resolution of conflicts which originated with the infusion of World Bank funds supporting development projects. We propose to initiate the FOURTH WORLD MITIGATION PROJECT.

We are writing to the Needmore Fund seeking your sponsorship of our project either in whole or in part. For your information, we have prepared the enclosed Proposal Abstract of the FOURTH WORLD MITIGATION PROJECT and request your consideration.

We recognize that our approach to resolving conflicts between Fourth World Nations and States represents an innovation in international relations. It is for this very reason that we wish to undertake the present project. We are hopeful that the approach will provide the foundations for resolving many other similar conflicts - especially in South America and Africa.

### INFORMATION CONCERNING GRANTING POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

The Wenner-Gren Foundation for Anthropological Research, Incorporated, is a non-profit private/operational foundation created and endowed in 1941 as The Viking Fund, Inc. by Axel Leonard Wenner-Gren. Its sphere of interest is the support of research in all branches of anthropology and in related disciplines pertaining to the sciences of man. Projects supported use cross-cultural, historical, biological and linguistic approaches towards understanding man's origins, development and variation. Special consideration is given to projects integrating two or more subfields of anthropology or related disciplines, particularly when combined with theoretical or methodological issues.

### Foundation aid does not support:

- 1. Large-scale projects
- Salary and/or fringe benefits
- 3. Tuition
- 4. Non-project personnel
- 5. Travel to national meetings
- 6. Dissertation publication
- 7. Institutional overhead

### CATEGORIES OF APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS-IN-AID ACCEPTED BY THE FOUNDATION

SMALL GRANTS PROGRAM: Small grants are available to accredited scholars and to students enrolled for an advanced degree, and cover any research expenses contemplated by the applicant (exceptions cited above). Awards usually range from \$500 - \$7,000 and are primarily for basic research. A small percentage of awards is available for feasibility studies, study trips and small conferences or workshops. Small grants are geared to seeding innovative or untried approaches and ideas, and provide material support to encourage aid from other funding agencies.

The Foundation generally gives *low priority* to filmmaking and to publication subvention, unless resulting from research or conferences previously carried out under the auspices of the Foundation.

REGULAR GRANTS are awarded to individual scholars from anywhere in the world who are affiliated with an accredited institution or organization.

RICHARD CARLEY HUNT MEMORIAL POST-DOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS are awarded to younger scholars to aid completion of specific studies or for preparation for publication of field materials. These have a maximum award of \$4,000 and are non-renewable.

STUDENT GRANTS are awarded to individuals at the advanced predoctoral level. Application must be made jointly with an involved senior scholar who will undertake complete responsibility for the project's supervision on both substantive and financial levels. Anyone enrolled in a degree program at the time of application must be considered by the Foundation to be in the student category.

Whenever possible student applicants from North America, Western Europe and Japan should demonstrate the availability of matching funds. However, any worthy project will be taken under consideration despite lack of such funds, regardless of the citizenship of the applicant.

- POST-DOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS: Awards up to \$15,000, no more than two awarded annually, are available to recent Ph.D's in the anthropological sciences for the purpose of training in a related field or fields outside anthropology. Formal enrollment or association with a non-anthropological department or research laboratory is required. The program of study must be designed to broaden interdisciplinary skills relevant to a particular problem or project within the candidate's area of specialization. Post-Doctoral Fellowships are not designed to support fieldwork. Application materials for Post-Doctoral Fellowships are mailed on request.
- 3] DEVELOPING COUNTRY FELLOWSHIPS: Fellowships of up to \$12,500, no more than three fellowships annually, are available to qualified scholars or students from developing countries. These fellowships are designed primarily to support younger scholars who need training unavailable in their home country and who cannot meet the costs of such training elsewhere. Additional information and application materials for Developing Country Fellowships are mailed on request.

- 4] <u>SENIOR SCHOLAR RESEARCH STIPENDS</u>: Stipends of up to \$10,000 are available each year to a maximum of three senior scholars who have established records of research and publication. The stipends provide support for writing and study integrating the scholar's past research with his/her current interests. Priority consideration will be given to retired scholars, to those about to retire, or to those who have no facilities at the time of application. Application materials for Senior Scholar Research Stipends are mailed on request.
- FOUNDATION-ADMINISTERED CONFERENCES: In addition to awarding direct grants-in-aid for conferences, the Foundation accepts proposals from accredited scholars for conferences to be administered by the Foundation under its Conference Program. Foundation assistance varies with the size and logistics of each conference. Additional information and application materials concerning Foundation-administered conferences are mailed on request.

The Foundation's policy is to request from the grantee the following:

- 1] acknowledgement of Wenner-Gren Foundation aid in publications reporting results of research.
- 2] presentation of one copy of each publication to the Foundation's Library,
- 3] compliance by the grantee with Limitations and Conditions on Grants-in-Aid set forth by the Internal Revenue Service of the United States of America.

### HOW TO APPLY

- Stage I: Applicants to the Small Grants Program are required to submit project description forms, which are available on request. Project description forms will be accepted only in accordance with the Current Deadline

  Schedule (see attached). Applicants in other categories may submit a brief description of the proposed project, including anticipated starting date and required funding.
- Stage II: If a project is considered eligible, a formal application will be invited and the appropriate forms and guidelines supplied. Application may be made by an individual or on behalf of a societal organization. Please note that copies or facsimiles of project description forms or application forms will not be accepted. It is not necessary to present an application by means of a personal interview. Applications will be accepted only in accordance with the Current Deadline Schedule (see attached).





The Rockefeller Foundation is a philanthropic organization, endowed by John D. Rockefeller and chartered in 1913 "to promote the wellbeing of mankind throughout the world." From the beginning, the Foundation's work has been directed toward identifying and attacking at their source the underlying causes of human suffering and need. During its early years, the Foundation was active chiefly in public health and medical education. Its program was later expanded to include the agricultural, natural, and social sciences and the arts and humanities. Today, the Foundation is carrying out its work within six fields: the agricultural sciences, the arts and humanities, equal opportunity for minority groups, international relations, the health sciences, and the population sciences.

### **GOVERNANCE**

The Foundation is administered by its president through corporate officers and program officers drawn from scholarly and scientific disciplines.

Program guidelines and financial policy are set and appropriations approved by an independent Board of Trustees, which meets three times a year—in April, September, and December. An Executive Committee of trustees also meets regularly to consider additional grant proposals recommended by the officers.

### METHODS OF OPERATION

The programs of the Foundation are carried out through the awarding of grants and fellowships.

### Grants

The Foundation receives each year about 8,000 proposals for funding; with limited funds, it can act favorably on only a relatively small number of these. The criteria for evaluation are: relevance of the project to the Foundation's program objectives and

potential for contributing significantly to the well-being of mankind; extent of the applicant's effort to secure additional and subsequent funding from other sources; and the applicant's record of achievement.

Foundation officers travel extensively to visit Foundation-supported projects and to observe ongoing programs of potential interest. Consultants frequently are used to supplement the officers' experience in assessing the proposals they receive. When the nature and quality of a project meet program guidelines, the proposal is considered in relation to other pending proposals, and eventually a recommendation may be made for support in the form of a grant.

### Fellowships

The Rockefeller Foundation has had fellowship programs for more than 65 years. The functions of the fellowship programs have been to select men and women of outstanding promise in fields of interest defined by Foundation policy, and to help prepare the fellows to make significant contributions to research and teaching or public service in the future. More than 12,000 individuals from all over the world have held fellowships awarded by the Foundation.

The Foundation supports two categories of fellowship awards:

### I. Regular Fellowship Awards.

These are administered by the Foundation's Fellowship Office and are awarded almost entirely to qualified candidates who are staff members or potential staff members of developing-country institutions with which the Foundation has cooperative programs.

### II. Special Fellowship Awards.

These fellowships are administered by the Foundation's various programs and are open to qualified candidates on a competitive basis.

resources, the Foundation must necessarily concentrate its support on projects that fall within defined program areas. In addition, the Foundation does not, on principle, undertake to: give or lend money for personal aid to individuals; appraise or subsidize cures or inventions; contribute to the establishment of local hospitals, churches, schools, libraries, or welfare agencies, or to their building and operating funds; finance altruistic movements involving private profit; support propaganda or attempts to influence legislation; or invest in securities on a philanthropic basis.

The Rockefeller Foundation does not normally provide general institutional support. Exceptions are made in the case of organizations or institutions in the creation of which the Foundation has played an important role, at least during their formative years. Exceptions are also occasionally made on behalf of organizations that serve and support organized philanthropy in the United States. Further, efforts are made to assure that the full direct costs of a project are taken into account in the calculation of grants budgets.

### **APPLICATIONS**

No special form is required in making a request for Foundation aid. An application should be addressed to the assistant secretary of the Foundation or to the director for the division in which the proposal would seem to fall (see page 13). It should include:

- A description of the project, with clearly stated plans and objectives;
- A comprehensive plan for the total funding of the project during and, where applicable, after the proposed grant period;
- A listing of the applicant's qualifications and accomplishments.

Fellowship Program in the Humanities to support humanistic scholarship intended to illuminate and assess social and cultural values and major issues of the contemporary world.

Fellowship Program in International Relations—to support analysis by young post-doctoral scholars of alternative policies in two interrelated areas—international security and international economic relations—that are likely to affect international relations in the 1980s.

Fellowship Program for Minority-Group Scholars—to support research designed to influence the understanding and resolution of minority-group issues.

Fellowships in Population Sciences—for advanced training in reproductive biology/medicine and in population studies in demography.

### PROGRAMS OF THE ROCKEFELLER FOUNDATION

The Foundation largely concentrates its efforts on selected programs with well-defined goals. It tries to keep its overall program flexible and dynamic through periodic reappraisals and changes in the light of new needs and opportunities.

At present, the program guidelines are as follows:

### Agricultural Sciences

In the agricultural sciences Foundation grants are made to encourage research and action programs that are dedicated to providing adequate food supplies and distribution in the developing world. Accordingly, the Foundation has helped to establish a network of international agricultural research institutes in a number of nations, and it continues to

support the programs that they engender. In addition, in making current grants the Foundation is focusing on three specific objectives:

 Strengthening food and agricultural systems in sub-Saharan Africa;

Supporting research and practical applica-

tion of genetic engineering methods to improve crop and animal productivity;

Promoting institutional cooperation to address critical agricultural issues.


These objectives represent a commitment by the Foundation to the problem of providing adequate food supplies and distribution in nations of the Third World. Furthermore, they embody the recognition that hunger and malnutrition must be addressed through a partnership of the biological and social sciences concerned with food and agricultural development.

### Arts and Humanities

The Arts and Humanities program has as its fundamental purposes the encouragement of creative work by artists, scholars, and teachers, and the channeling of that work into the broader society. Toward those ends the program operates under the following four general guidelines. Specific programs, under these guidelines, will continue to be formulated to give clear guidance to grant seekers.

 Support for the creative person—the Foundation recognizes the creative individual as central to the arts and humanities, just as it sees the arts and humanities as central to understanding history and society. Most often, support to stimulate new work is arranged through programs of awards or fellowships. tice, and the organization and administration of health services and as means of extending the vision and understanding of physicians and others beyond the individual patient;

Coping with biomedical information—to



assist producers, librarians, and users of the scientific literatures and statistical data in identifying and utilizing the small proportion of information that is significant and relevant to particular needs through the design of practical, rational health information and communication systems.

### Special Interests and Explorations

Under its Special Interests and Explorations program, the Foundation allows itself the flexibility to examine for possible support proposals that do not fall within the existing programs, and to raise the financial guidelines of existing programs to act favorably on proposals of exceptional merit that would otherwise go unsupported for lack of program funds.

### Bellagio Study and Conference Center

The Foundation maintains the Bellagio Study and Conference Center, located in northern Italy on Lake Como. Each year, the Center is host to approximately 35 conferences that focus on topics of international importance relating to one of the Foundation's program areas. In addition, the Foundation offers approximately 80 residencies of about four weeks each to scholars, writers, and composers engaged in major projects that relate in some way to the Foundation's own program interests. Additional information on these programs can be obtained by writing to the Conference Coordinator in New York.

striving toward the goal of population stabilization through support of research, training, and experimental programs in a broad range of fields related to population. Current program objectives are as follows:

- Research in reproductive biology—strengthening research both by supporting individuals presently engaged in significant work and by drawing new people of excellence into the field;
- Research on new contraceptive technology
   —maintaining strong research efforts to
   develop safer, more effective, and inex pensive methods of fertility regulation;
- Policy studies—helping to shape national policy formulation through research and training to improve the understanding of the determinants of fertility and of the socioeconomic factors affecting population dynamics and acceptance of contraceptive technology.

Medicine and health have been concerns of the Foundation since its inception, and, in fact, it was in these fields that the Foundation first became widely known and respected. The Health Sciences program is currently focusing on:

- Great neglected diseases—to increase both our knowledge and means of control of the great neglected diseases of the developing world by attracting outstanding biomedical scientists to these problems through the formation of an international network of investigative units, and to apply the results of this work through operational studies in the less-developed countries;
- Health of populations—to foster quantitative approaches in clinical medicine and the provision of health care through the use of population-based disciplines (biometry, demography, epidemiology, health statistics, and survey methods) as integral parts of medical education, clinical prac-

Foundation supports programs to strengthen classroom teaching in the arts and humanities and programs to link the schools with other educational and cultural institutions, such as universities, museums, and public libraries.

- Enhancing the American public's understanding of international affairs through the arts and humanities—an interdependent world requires citizens with international knowledge and perspectives, and with facility in foreign languages. The Foundation supports the efforts of educational, artistic, and cultural organizations to inform Americans about the world and to cultivate cross-cultural understanding with the United States.
- Forging connections between artists, humanists, and society—artists and humanists in our society often work in relative isolation, their creations only slowly filtering through cultural and educational institutions to the larger public. The Foundation supports programs that strengthen the connection between individual artists, humanists, and the institutions that may influence and be influenced by their work.

### **Equal Opportunity**

The Foundation's Equal Opportunity program, established in 1963, attempts to assure full participation of minorities in the benefits as well as the obligations of American citizenship. While significant gains have been made by American minority groups over the past several decades, this progress has revealed more sharply the extent of the problems still confronting racial minorities and has made it clear that major tasks lie ahead. As only one of many organizations endeavoring to establish equal opportunity for all Americans, the Foundation is focusing on three areas:

• Expanding economic opportunity—the iden-

tification of effective strategies for improving the employment and income status of minority groups, with special emphasis on youth and families headed by minoritygroup women;

- Broadening career opportunities—support for promising minority-group students in the natural and life sciences, and in economics, especially at the graduate level;
- Support and protection of basic rights assistance to selected individuals and to national and regional organizations involved in promoting equal opportunity policies and practices in education, employment, and public governance.

Following an initiative introduced in 1981, the program seeks to aid single, minority women who are heads of households. Grants are made to selected national and regional organizations with a proven community-based record of preparing such women for constructive work in the private sector. Knowing how relatively few women will benefit from the Foundation's very limited effort, the program will use carefully constructed research and evaluation procedures to pinpoint the most successful approaches toward providing support in this area.

### International Relations

The Rockefeller Foundation considers the vigorous pursuit of humane, wise, and peaceful relations among countries an important corollary to its objectives in other programs. Two broad issues warrant sustained attention:

- I. How might threats to peace arising from the intersection of local tensions and the competition for security or influence between the United States and the Soviet Union, be reduced?
- II. How can political and institutional obstacles to sound management of economic relations among countries be overcome?

Governments ultimately must answer these long-range questions, but the burden of day-to-day problem solving makes it difficult for them to do so. Therefore, an appropriate goal for the International Relations Program is to strengthen the contribution of independent research and policy analysis to the articulation of long-range goals and interests facing governments in the areas of international security and economic cooperation. In pursuit of this goal, the Foundation provides funding for the achievement of four objectives:

- Within the United States, to strengthen
  the contribution of nongovernmental international relations research to United States
  foreign policy. To achieve this objective,
  the Foundation will provide two kinds of
  funding: —project support for research
  with well-designed means for making the
  results available and useful to policymakers;
  and core support over a period of years
  for a limited number of institutions engaged in research and training, chosen
  through formal competition;
- In countries other than the United States, to strengthen the analytical capacity of international relations research institutions that can operate substantially without government constraint and have the potential to increase the intellectual underpinnings of these countries' foreign policies;
- To provide more effective opportunities for public and private experts from different countries to jointly analyze problems and develop practical solutions that can command wide public support;
- Through its fellowship program and other mechanisms, to identify outstanding young people trained in international relations and increase their opportunities for career development.

### Population and Health

# General imformation

### **Appropriations**

The Corporation's fiscal year is October 1 to September 30. Grants amounting to \$13,293,284 were voted during the fiscal year ended September 30, 1983. This figure includes \$754,845 for the international program.

## The Corporation's program

Although its purposes are broadly stated, the Corporation has a policy of selecting a few areas at a time in which to concentrate its grants. During 1983, the foundation undertook a full review of its grant programs under the direction of its new president, David A. Hamburg, who took office in December 1982. The trustees have determined to continue the foundation's long-standing interest in the development of human resources and to concentrate on four broad goals.

The first goal is the avoidance of nuclear war and improvement in U.S.-Soviet Union relations. The grant program will support science-based analyses of ways in which the risk of nuclear war can be diminished and efforts to ensure that the results of such analyses are widely known and understood. It will emphasize the mobilization of the best possible intellectual, technical, and moral resources to work toward this objective.

The second is the education of all Americans, especially youth, for a scientifically and technologically based economy. The program will link the movement for educational reform to changes

# Carnegie Corporation of New York

Carnegie Corporation of New York is a philanthropic foundation created by Andrew Carnegie in 1911 to promote the advancement and diffusion of knowledge and understanding. The Corporation's capital fund, originally donated at a value of about \$135 million, now has a market worth of approximately \$513 million. Currently, the Corporation commits around \$20 million each year to grants, primarily for the people of the United States, but 7.4 percent of that amount is allocated to educational endeavors in some of the British overseas Commonwealth.

For the first eight years of the Corporation's history, Mr. Carnegie himself was president of the board of trustees, and the administration was chiefly under his personal direction. Shortly after his death in 1919 the trustees elected a full-time president as the chief executive officer of the Corporation.

### How to submit a proposal

There is no formal procedure for submitting a proposal. All that is necessary for preliminary consideration is a statement describing the project's aims, methods, personnel, and the amount of financial support required.

The officers review all proposals in the light of their knowledge of the field and in relation to the Corporation's current program priorities. They ask for supplementary information or a personal discussion when either would be helpful in making a judgment. The endorsement of the administrative head of an institution need not be sent with the initial proposal but will be requested before a favorable recommendation is made to the Corporation's trustees.

Carnegie United Kingdom Trust (Dunfermline), 1913, for improvement of the well-being of the people of Great Britain and Ireland, chiefly through aid to educational institutions and agencies of the drama, music, social services, etc.

Some of Mr. Carnegie's notable individual public gifts include his contributions to the construction of the Peace Palace at The Hague and the Pan American Union building in Washington, D.C. His personal gifts and bequests to institutions and organizations totaled \$311 million.

Mr. Carnegie also established the following philanthropic agencies outside the United States:

Carnegie Trust for the Universities of Scotland (Edinburgh), 1901, for assistance to students, for expansion of the Scottish universities, and for stimulation of research.

Carnegie Dunfermline Trust, 1903, for betterment of social conditions in Mr. Carnegie's native

Carnegie Hero Fund Trust (Dunfermline), 1906, for recognition of heroic acts performed in the peaceful walks of life in Great Britain and Ireland.

Carnegie Hero Funds in Europe, established during 1909-11 in France, Germany, Norway, Switzerland, the Netherlands, Sweden, Denmark, Belgium, and Italy. (Some of the Funds are no longer active.)

Andrew Carnegie was born in Scotland in 1835. The son of a weaver, he came with his family to the United States in 1848 and went to work as a bobbin boy in a cotton mill. He moved rapidly through a succession of jobs with Western Union and the Pennsylvania Railroad. In 1865 he resigned to establish his own business enterprises and eventually organized the Carnegie Steel Company which launched the huge steel industry in Pittsburgh. At the age of 65, he sold the Company to J. P. Morgan for \$400 million and devoted the rest of his life to his philanthropic activities and writing, including his autobiography.

Most men of wealth have contributed to charity to alleviate the sufferings of their fellow men, but Andrew Carnegie was perhaps the first to state publicly that rich men have a moral obligation to give away their fortunes. In 1889 he wrote his "Gospel of Wealth," in which he asserted that all personal wealth beyond that required to supply the needs of one's family should be regarded as a trust fund to be administered for the benefit of the community.

# Other Carnegie organizations

He set about disposing of his fortune through innumerable personal gifts and through the establishment of various trusts. In his 30s—when most successful men have barely established themselves in business—Mr. Carnegie had already begun to give away some of his fast-accumulating funds. His first large gifts were made to his native town, Dunfermline, Scotland. Later he created seven phillanthropic and educational organizations in the United States, including Carnegie Corporation, and several more in Europe (see pp. 7-9).

One of his lifelong interests was the establishment of free public of self-education. After termination of this program libraries in the whole world when, in 1881, Mr. in 1917, the Corporation continued for about 40 years its interest in the improvement of library services. Other major programs in the Corporation's early history included adult education and education in the fine arts.

Each of the other organizations established by Mr. Carnegie has its own funds and trustees and is independently managed.

The other agencies that he set up in the United States are:

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching (5 lvy Lane, Princeton, New Jersey 08540), 1905, an operating foundation which primarily sponsors policy studies on American higher education.

Carnegie Institute (Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania 15213), 1896, comprising a music hall, museums of art and of natural history, and a division of education.

Carnegie-Mellon University (Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania 15213), formed from the merger in 1967 of Mellon Institute and Carnegie Institute of Technology, which was founded in 1900 as a division of Carnegie Institute and later became an independent university.
